MONEY FOR KATANGA

AMERICAN FRIENDS OF KATANGA is making no appeal in this newsletter for funds for its own operations, although we scarcely have enough to pay postage on our mail. The need of the Government of President Tshombe for funds is so urgent that we are instead asking all members to send at least one dollar directly to the Katangan Minister of Finance, J.-B. Kibwe, Élizabethville, Katanga. In this connection it is of the utmost importance that all envelopes destined for Katanga be clearly marked "VIA BRUSSELS;" otherwise they may be routed through Léopoldville, where they will be confiscated.

Much is written in the American press about "mercenaries" serving in the Katangan military forces. Nothing could be more ludicrous. Katanga is scraping the bottom of the barrel to buy equipment and arms to beat off a modern, military invasion by the United Nations, and has no money to pay for anything else. No matter what you read in the papers, no European personnel serving Katanga (and they are pitifully few) are receiving any pay from the Tshombe Government. Katanga maintains an information service in New York which has a staff totalling three persons. It can hardly meet the office rent. The population of the country is relatively small - about two million. And although there is excellent potential for building a substantial economy, nothing can be done about this until the United Nations calls off the dogs. Meantime the majority of the people are live in the ancient ways off the land and rarely see any cash, much less pay any substantial taxes. Meantime, we who live in New York are only too well aware of the luxurious living conditions of the representatives of the Léopoldville "government." They often stay at

posh hotels (e.g. the Waldorf-Towers), they are seen in the finest they buzz about town in air-conditioned Cadillacs restaurants, and they are feted everywhere by the rich of Liberaldom.

Obviously their money is coming from somewhere beyond the borders of the Congo.

In view of the burst of thoughtless sentimentality on the part of a California housewife who recently enjoyed headline space in The New York Times and elsewhere, by contributing \$1,000 to the United Nations, and more especially in view of the rifling of UNICEF funds (which are supposed to be used for feeding the hungry children of the world) by the General Assembly to pay for the continuing slaughter of Katangans, we feel that it would be a solid answer to these outrages for AMERICAN FRIENDS OF KATANGA to contribute at least \$1,000 to the Katangan treasury. Therefore we urge you; nay, we beg you, to send at least one dollar to Élizabeth-ville, VIA BRUSSELS;

The leading membersof Congress who have xxxx spoken out on this subject are Senator Thomas J. Dodd of Connecticut and Representative Donald C. Bruce of Indiana. Copies may be obtained by writing to these Members of Congress in Washington.

A NETWORK OF CHAPTERS

The possibilities of really effective action by AMERICAN FRIENDS OF KATANGA working through a system of chapters located all over the country are almost illimitable. Other conservative organizations have already shown the usefulness of this method, as indeed have many Liberal EXECUTE groups.

It is particularly important to inaugurate chapters at the colleges and universities, where enthusiasm for the conservative revival is running especially high, Regular community chapters are also, of course, very effective. Those of our members who wish to do so are authorized by the New York office to establish chapters as they see fit, subject to reasonable conformance with the aims of the organization as a whole. We should like such chapters to submit to us a list of members' names and addresses, and those of the officers of the chapter. There will normally be a President or Chairman, Vice President or Vice Chairman, and a Secretary-Treasurer.

The New York office does not envision a rigid hierarchical pyramid, and will not require set dues from
members. However, since money is, to a large degree,
power in an organization like ours, we should be very
glad if new chapters would resolve to contribute, say,
one dollar per member per month. The Secretary-Treasurer
could collect this money, pay the chapter's obligations
with it, and forward the remainder, if any, to the

New York Office, or, in line with our plea for funds for the Katangan Treasury elsewhere in this newsletter, the chapter might send money directly to Katanga.

Chapters, although required expected to keep the New York office informed of their activities, would be quite free to undertake any activities, such as lectures, demonstrations, or other work, so long as it did not interfere seriously with the co-ordinated work of the organization as a whole or did not conflict with the aims of our group.

We welcome the formation of chapters, then, and remain at all times open to construction suggestions from both chapters and individual members. AMERICAN FRIENDS OF KATANGA is preparing a general informational paper on Katanga, since we are acutely aware of the urgent need for background among Americans concerned with the plight of this beleaguered land. However, until that paper can be prepared, and because many inquiries have been received about other groups working for Katangan freedom, we list below several addresses which may be useful.

A recent issue of L'ÉCHO DU KATANGA contained an announcement that a library on Katangan affairs was being formed by Monsieur M. Bernard, La Maison Katangaise, 74, rue de Namur, Louvain, Belgium. He asked for books, magazine articles, etc., - and money. We recommend assistance to M. Bernard. Letters may be in English.

On the language problem, it may be generally stated that all communications may be sent in English. Since nearly all educated Belgians have learned English as well as the two languages of Belgium, the reply will probably arrive in English as well. This also applies to letters sent to Katanga itself.

Encouraging letters to President Tshombe would also be welcome, but they should make it clear that no reply is expected. Please see our newsletter plea for funds for the Katangan Treasury. In all cases, when communicating with anyone in Katanga, it is essential to mark the envelopes clearly "VTA BRUSSELS," so that they will not be routed through Léopoldville, where they will be confiscated.

Dear Friend:

A group of us, concerned about our government's disastrous policy toward Katanga and the prospects of a communist takeover of central Africa with the active help of the Soviet-dominated UN, recently formed a committee of AMERICAN FRIENDS OF KATANGA. Our purpose was to rally public opinion against our government's sanctioning and participation in a UN war against Katanga. However,

our worst dreads have become realities, and all of us watched with horror as the UN -- logistically and financially supported by our taxes -- bombed and strafed hospitals and schools, churches and homes, killing and maiming innocent women and children whose sole crime was the desire to be free.

Because of our country's complicity in this immoral and ignoble action, we have lost the confidence of the most courageous anti-communists in all Africa. Had we Americans been better prepared for the events that were to come, we might have been able to veto them by a mass protest to our leaders.

Therefore, because we know of the terrible dangers that lie ahead, we have decided to consolidate and enlarge our organization so that, as individuals, we shall be better prepared to exert pressure when the occasion demands it.

Our purpose will be to keep the American public informed of the complicated events in central Africa and to lend moral support to the Katangans in their gallant and continued efforts to resist the encroachments of communism. We shall also dedicate ourselves to reconstructing friendly relations between the people of Katanga and ourselves. In addition, we shall watch carefully our country's further participation in the actions of the UN and alert our fellow citizens to the great dangers therein. Already, the UN is being groomed to fight new wars against anti-communists in different parts of the world. The coming two years will probably be the most dangerous ones in all our history. Only by organizing into a potent group will our individual voices have any effect on public opinion and, thereby, on our leaders.

Dear Friend:

Thank you for your inquiry about the AMERICAN FRIENDS OF KATANGA. The purpose of our organization will be to try to influence our government to reverse its disastrous unfriendly policy toward Katanga. The left-wing enemies of Katanga have committed themselves to the total destruction of that free, self-supporting and fiercely anti-communist state in the heart of Africa. Their reasons are obvious: Katanga is the living proof that Europeans and Africans can work together on a basis of mutual self-respect. Katanga is also an African state that believes in free-enterprise, the basic rights of the individual, and the sanctity of private property. Moreover, Katanga has not asked for a handout from the American taxpayer. This, in the eyes of the communists, might serve as too strong an example for the other ex-colonies.

In addition, Katanga has 70% of the world's cobalt resources; and how much better can the communists cripple the West's nuclear defense than by depriving us of the essential raw materials? What it means, finally, is that the communists will not rest until they have conquered Katanga, and they are using the U.N.__the Trojan horse of our time_as the best-suited instrument by which to accomplish this.

It will be our job to get American public opinion solidly behind the best potential ally we have in Africa. Our State Department, which has misled us time and time again, is basically in sympathy with the UN's objectives. We, the people of this country, must make it plain to the Administration that we are against the UN's policy to destroy Katanga and protest our government's complicity in this policy.

How can we do this? There are many ways. Individually, we can write to President Kennedy, Adlai Stevenson, G. Mennen Williams, Secretary of State Dean Rusk and our Congressmen. We can and should also write to our local newspapers as well as to such national magazines as Life, Look, Time or Newsweek whenever they carry articles lauding the UN for its glorious work in the Congo. The organs of the press must feel the pressure of our indignation. We should always threaten to cancel our subscriptions if the newspapers or magazines to which we subscribe fail to report the news objectively.

As a group there are many other things we can do. We can take ads in the major newspapers; we can hold public forums; we can distribute literature. But all of this takes money. Each one of us is forced by way of taxation to support financially the work of the State Department and the UN; but the only way we can sponsor really effective anti-Communist work is by voluntary contribution. Therefore, I appeal to you to contribute whatever you can to our working fund. I agree with you that if our government was doing the job, we would not have to do it ourselves. But this is the tragedy of our nation and our time.

Our first project is underway. We are preparing a monthly Newsletter, the first issue of which will be sent to you as soon as it is ready. This Newsletter will be distributed as widely as resources permit. There are other projects that can be initiated. And here is where you come in. Most of you have asked what can you do to help. This article, by Prof. Marcel de Corte and entitled "Une entreprise américaine," says that the brother of the late Dag Hammerskjoeld is administrator of one of the largest copper companies in the world, which stands to benefit if Katanga falls and the Leopold-ville government should annul the franchise of the Union Minière. Then the article goes on to say that Mr. Adlai Stevenson, before becoming US delegate to the United Nations, was president of the Tempelsman company which deals in industrial diamonds. According to the article, the Tempelsman people are making arrangements to purchase the entire diamond production of the Congo from the Leopoldville government.

For reasons which you can appreciate, I do not feel that I should use this information in my lectures to students or otherwise without having some documentation providing solid proof of its accuracy. I wonder, therefore, if your office can throw any light on this subject?

Dear Professor Glaser:

We wish to thank you for your letter of 1st December which contained a clipping of a letter which you had written to the Alton Evening Telegraph. We certainly are in accord with your sentiments as expressed in that published letter.

We have received information about the alleged involvement of the late Mr. Hammarskjöld's brother and Mr. Stevenson in certain business transactions similar to the indications contained in your letter. Unfortunately our information so far is also from secondary sources, although we are attempting to make inquiries about the matter in certain quarters.

If we are able to turn up anything more substantial, we shall communicate with you. If this information is, in fact, accurate, it might be a potent weapon on our side. In this connection, you might write to Mr. A. J. Dens, Post Office Box Nº 1443, Harlingen, Texas, who also seems interested in this problem. Whether he has any more information than you do, we cannot say. Mr. Dens has not identified himself fully to us, but we assume from his handwriting and from the faulty English of his letter, that he is of European, perhaps Belgian, origin. I am sorry that we cannot offer you more help than this just now. We are having a terrifid struggle to get our organization off the ground, and so far have not turned up any results in this interesting facet of our work. We hope that, should you find anything definite, you will let us know.

Thank you for your letter of December 1 and the clipping.

I am aware of the two stories concerning Hammerskjoeld's brother and Stevenson's connection with the Tempelsman firm. However I only know of this through secondary sources, and so cannot provide you with any more assurance of their authenticity than you have already. The Stevenson story seems to have had its maintainst appearance in print in a Belgian publication.
