Part Three of this book is devoted to the most neglected of the three R's, Writing. The reasons for teaching cursive first are explained in an introductory essay. Very simply put, cursive should be taught first because if you do so, your child will become a good cursive writer and can learn to print later on very well. However, if you teach print-script first, your child may never develop a good cursive handwriting because of the habits acquired in printing for the first two years. These habits most often create obstacles to the development of a good cursive handwriting.
